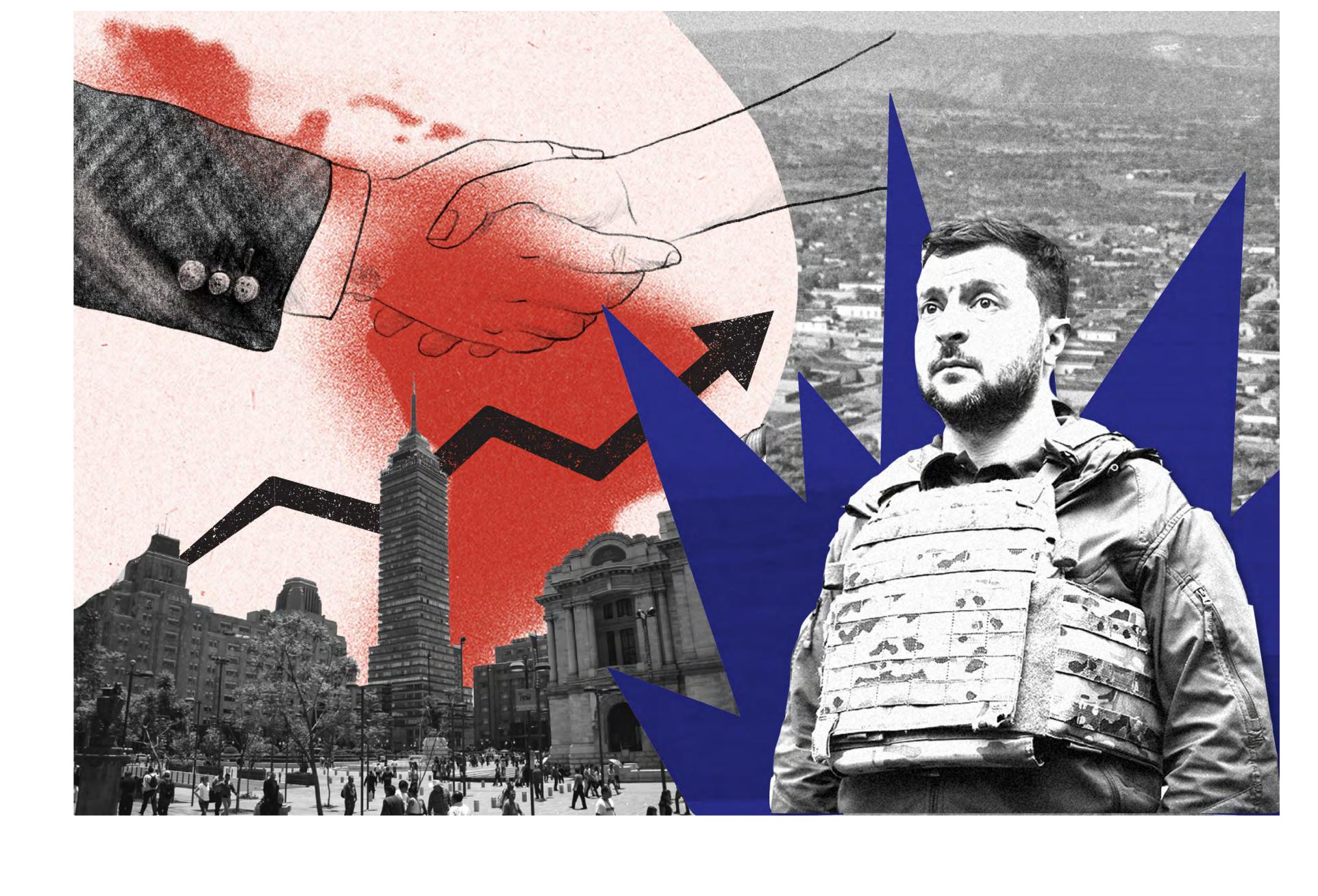

In addition to the global consequences of this serious conflict and its ramifications for the region (analyzed in this newsletter), Latin America and the Caribbean are in the midst of complicated processes, such as elections —in the case of Brazil and Colombia—, conflicts at the United States-Mexico border over migration, political instability in Peru and the constitutional process in Chile. Among the events in the region, the **chain of assassinations** of social leaders who defend environmental causes, transgender identities or the Peace Agreement (Mexico, Brazil, Honduras and Colombia)

is especially serious. The murder of Paraguayan prosecutor Marcelo Pecci while on his honeymoon in

the region. The murders, in June, of British journalist Dom Philips and Bruno Pereira, a former employee of the Brazilian agency for indigenous communities (FUNAI), (practically dismantled by Jair Bolsonaro's government) are an <u>example</u> of the attacks on social activists and the impunity enjoyed mainly by the instigators of these crimes. Philips and Pereira were investigating illicit activities against the environment in the Javarí valley (Amazon), a region with practically no state presence but a strong presence

The war in Ukraine has global consequences. In the case of Latin America, up until now, these consequences have been political (countries that support sanctions against Russia and five that abstained)

and economic (a rise in inflation and food prices). In the long term, If a new bloc politics emerges around the United States, China and Russia, the countries in the region could be pressured to align. This context may prove to be an opportunity to

establish a different relationship with the European Union, as the Carolina Foundation suggests. Érika Ruíz Sandoval (Colegio de México and Centro de Investigación y Docencia Económicas -CIDE) and Marcos Robledo (former Undersecretary of Defense of Chile) analyze the factors at play and
